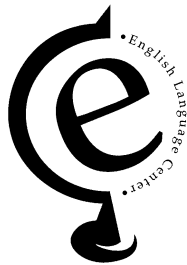

A friend of yours is interested in visiting the state of Michigan in the U.S. and has sent you the information below. Read it and answer the questions that follow.

When you visit Michigan, don't forget Traverse City

The first thing that comes to most people's minds when they think about Michigan may be Detroit and automobile manufacturing. Or, maybe it's the Great Lakes. However, there are also **notable** tourist attractions in Michigan that are not as well known. For example, there are inland lakes for boating and fishing, and orchards and wineries for great fruit and award-winning wines. In particular, Michigan's "west coast" along the shores of Lake Michigan offers many recreation sites. One of the most popular is Traverse City.

Traverse City is located on Lake Michigan, or, more precisely, on Traverse Bay. While that means cold winters, it also means late evening sun in the summer when sundown comes just after 9:30 pm. The best known view of the stunning summer sunsets in the city is on top of the tenth story of The Park Place Hotel. **The city itself offers a pedestrian-friendly downtown** with over 150 shops, galleries and restaurants. Visitors can try a downtown restaurant, and then go to the Williamsburg Showcase Dinner Theater to listen to live music or to watch a theater performance.

The Traverse Bay area offers 180 miles of beautiful sandy beaches and picturesque lake-side villages along a coastline dotted with lighthouses. Hikers can enjoy spectacular views of lakes, forests and wildlife. Grand Traverse Bay is 32 miles long, and is divided into two "arms" by a narrow peninsula extending north from Traverse City. The bay is great for fishing, water skiing, boating, sailing, and swimming. For the fisherman, there are also nearby inland lakes, the beautiful Torch Lake and Elk Lake, which lie due east of the bay. Torch Lake is narrow, but 22 miles long. This is a water lover's paradise. And, of course, one can join a charter fishing trip onto Lake Michigan. In the summer months, golfing in the Traverse City area is also very popular. The state of Michigan has over 800 golf courses, and more than a dozen of them are located within 20 miles of downtown Traverse City, and another dozen within 30 miles.

During the winter, people in Michigan can enjoy both cross-country and downhill skiing in the Traverse area. In fact, the beautiful winters in Traverse City are a major reason why people say that the state of Michigan is a "Winter Wonderland!" In sum, Traverse City offers many outdoor recreation opportunities, fabulous hotels and clubs, and an environment where you can just enjoy time away from home in a scenic location. In any season you choose, you can have a wonderful time in Traverse City, Michigan!

Email

Your classmate has recently written an essay about using email for one of his classes and wanted to share it with you.

The invention of the Internet has changed the world. One of the biggest changes it brought to the world is that email has become one of the most favored means of communication. A 2008 survey showed that there are about 1.6 billion email users worldwide—that's more than one out of every five people. The large number of email users is an indication of the innumerable advantages it has. Despite its advantages, it has also brought some problems that bother the user every day.

Indeed, there is a long list of benefits email has made available to people, and the list is becoming longer as the brilliant IT people are developing new ways to use it everyday. The advantage that tops the list is probably its convenience. With just one click, you can reach anyone in the world at any time you want, and the recipient of your message can access it whenever and wherever he/she needs to. So using email brings convenience to the sender as well as the **recipient** of the message. Also, you can send the same message to as many people as possible if it applies to all of them. The second advantage is that it is cost efficient. Sending an email does not involve any cost, unlike other means of communication such as making a phone call or sending a letter by post. The third advantage of email is its **versatility**; that is, it can serve the user in many different ways. For instance, through some email services, not only can you send messages, but you can also chat with people if they are on your contact list and appear as logged in on the interface of your account. In addition, you can use it as a storage device given the large capacity of some email services. It would cost a lot to purchase a storage device with the same capacity such as a USB drive (alternatively called thumb/flash drive). Personally, I keep an "email copy" of everything I consider important in addition to saving it on a disc as well as on the hard drive of my computer.

Like everything else, email has its problems. To me, the biggest disadvantage is that messages can be misunderstood or misinterpreted because of the lack of facial expressions and gestures that are critical to successful communication. This is especially true when the message is exchanged between people who are not familiar with each other. Another disadvantage of email is related to its convenience: because it is convenient, people often don't bother to communicate in person even if they are next-door neighbors. As a result, people miss out on opportunities to practice their social skills. Other disadvantages include receiving junk emails and virus-spreading emails that **paralyze** your computer, the loss of handwriting skills, and the feeling, whether real or false, that one is missing vital communication when access to the Internet and/or a computer are unavailable.

While email has flaws, no one can deny its strengths. In my point of view, if something has more advantages than disadvantages, it should be encouraged. Given this, I vote for the use of email.

Sun Safety

Just before the summer holidays, you receive this pamphlet on staying safe in the sun.

Sunny days are part of what make the summer months so pleasant, and many people like to spend hot days enjoying the seashore. Not only that, but sunlight is necessary to help your body produce Vitamin D, which is important for good health. But too much ultraviolet (UV) light can seriously damage your skin over the long-term.

These days, most people know that too much sun can be harmful, but many people still don't take proper precautions. In fact, many people don't even know how to protect themselves effectively! By following the advice below, you can enjoy your time in the sun while keeping your skin healthy for many years to come.

Cover Up

If you are going to be outside for a long time, it is a good idea to wear clothing that covers as much of your skin as possible. But that's not the whole story; if you can see sunlight through the material of your shirt, UV light can also pass through and harm your skin. Generally, a t-shirt gives less protection than medium-strength sunscreen lotion. Recently, some companies have started making laundry detergents that can actually increase the protective strength of clothing.

Wear Sunscreen

If you are going to be in the sun, it is important that you wear sunscreen. Make sure you read the label carefully before you choose a sunscreen. The level of protection is described using a sun-protection factor (SPF) number. Doctors recommend using a lotion with an SPF of 15 or higher. Nowadays, it is possible to buy lotion with an SPF of up to 100, but no matter how strong the lotion is, you should apply it every two hours.

Wear Sunglasses

Spending long hours in the sun without protection can cause long-term damage to your eyes. Sunglasses do not have to be expensive, but they should have a label that says they provide 100% UV protection. If there is no label, assume that the glasses do not offer any protection. It does not matter if the lenses are dark, because an invisible chemical provides the UV protection. In fact, dark lenses without protection can be even more dangerous because the eyes open wider to let in light, which lets in more harmful UV radiation.

Be Careful During Midday Hours

UV rays are the most intense between 10 o'clock in the morning and 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Try to limit the time you spend outside during these hours. Be especially careful if you are at the beach, because both sand and water can reflect sunlight, magnifying the effect of exposure to the sun.

If you follow these tips, you can enjoy the summer while preserving the health of your skin for years to come!
